It started with 4 days of training (Foxoring, Sprint, Classic 80 + 2m), directly followed by the championship in the four categories. The biggest group of competitors were, as in some previous years, chinese kids from a school in Guangzou. I was the only non-US R2 competitor, and there were 3 'international' participants: my wife Brigitte and a couple from Australia.
